Now that acreage is covered in houses that overwhelm the land; the pond and its inhabitants are gone. This is why conservation is important to me—to preserve what we can that is remaining of our natural world and work to restore some balance to an environment that has been ravaged and strained by human activities. Through our actions here in Westport I want

to see us do our part and hopefully through our efforts and successes others will be influenced to do their part, locally and globally.

There is nothing like farm land rising up from coastal lands, being on the migratory path of millions of birds; watching winter ducks (bufflehead, mergansers, scaups, canvasbacks) bobbing around the Point docks on a blustery winter morning; seeing schools of bluefish and striped bass coming up the river; witnessing blue birds perching on bird boxes while barn swallows dart around the Herb Hadfield meadow; hearing the first osprey of spring on a clear, cool April morning; watching dozens of egrets settle for the night in the trees over a small pond near the river; walking up the Dunham's Brook trail and arriving at the old corn field that opens up to the sky–these are the things that make Westport and our area special to me.
